Dr Mohammad Hirman Ritom Abdullah said the rights of the indigenous people to their customary land, which embraced cultural sites and traditional burial places, should be upheld.

<br/>>p><br/>>p><br/>>Dr Ritom said the Penan community right to establishing native customary rights to land they had resettled had not been resolved.
<br/>>p><br/>>The Sarawak Land Code 1958 does not have provisions for the Penans to establish ownership of land on which they have traditionally lived for generations.
<br/>>p><br/>>Dr Ritom said more than half of the complaints Suhakam Sarawak received were related to land matters. Last year, the commission recorded 78 complaints.
